GERDY'S CONTINUES TO CHAMPION THE UNDERDOGS



We sincerely hope that this newsletter finds you in good health! This unprecedented year has forced all of us to adapt to the changes and to shift our priorities. Gerdy's Rescue has adjusted to the new order by extending a hand to those families affected by the pandemic, enforcing new criteria for adoptions like doing Covid-safe backyard home visits, adhering to veterinarian protocols, and keeping everyone safe.

The effects of the pandemic have deeply imprinted the animal rescue world, both positively and negatively. Many of you were fortunate to have already had a pet at home providing companionship during these difficult days, but many people have found themselves lonely with time on their hands and have reached out to rescues

and shelters to adopt a pet. As a result, adoptions everywhere have sky-rocketed creating a dearth of adoptable, domestic pets. The fallout from this is that kitten and puppy purchases from internet sites, from backyard breeders and from puppy mill operations have soared. We suspect that once life returns to normal, surrender and abandonment numbers will escalate.

Along with the very adoptable ones, Gerdy's continues to champion the underdogs, like the ones left behind requiring extensive medical care, the seniors and the palliative cases. They still need our help, pandemic or otherwise. Since March 2020 with the economic decline, many people in our animal community have found themselves out of work and in a pinch to find the extra

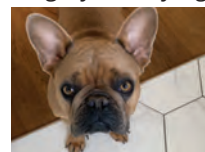
Pepper (was Mia) and Nixie

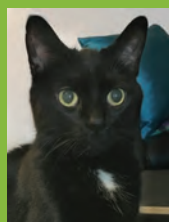

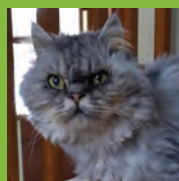
Against all odds

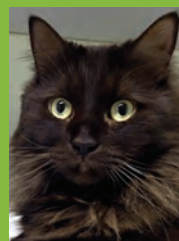
Off the streets
